## Letter from the Chairman



I greet you all in the name of the Father the Son and the Holy Spirit.

On behalf of the Board of Governors and staff of Sanyu Babies' Home I would like to whole heartedly appreciate the support and guidance we receive from the Bishop and the head of Mission of Namirembe Diocese. The meeting we had with the Bishop in his office on the 15<sup>th</sup> May 2013 was particularly encouraging. It gave us an opportunity to update him and to discuss ways through which the diocese will offer additional support. As we continue to receive abandoned but beautiful babies, we continue to search our minds for reasons why anyone would abandon such a bundle of joy and ways of stemming the tide of abandonment. Sanyu Babies' Home operates a three pronged approach in finding a family for the children to grow up in once they leave SBH: reunite them with existing family when located, find a foster family and if these two fail, find an adoptive family.

good work done. We thank God for healing Baby Trinity – daughter of Barbara the Administrator of SBH who spent quite some time in Hospital. Despite having to look after her very sick baby, I was impressed by her continuing care for the other 50 babies in Sanyu. Such commitment is shown by everyone at Sanyu. We are deeply indebted to you all. Oh how I wish this newsletter could go out (free of charge) to every home and church in the country. That will create awareness and garner support from a wide section of the community. That will however require a sponsor. If you are that sponsor please get in touch. ### New Arrivals

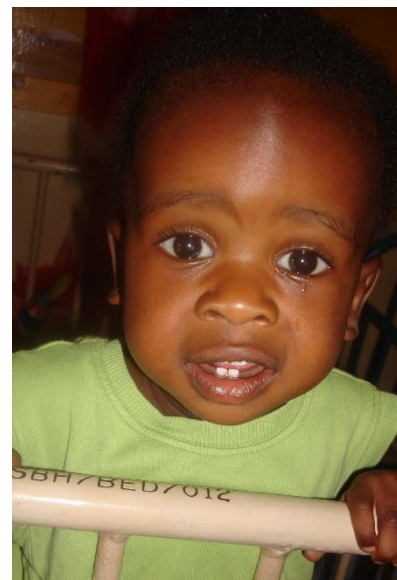

### Rest in Peace: Joram Lubega



Joram arrived at Sanyu Babies' Home on 8<sup>th</sup> January, 2013 at 3 months old. He was found abandoned in Kawaala near the KCCA clinic. While he was at Sanyu, he was seen by doctors at Kampala International Hospital and doctors at the Children's Clinic-Kampala Limited. He was treated for his cough with different medicines and sent back home. In the morning of 1<sup>st</sup> May, 2013, the staff at Sanyu noticed Joram had a very high fever and was convulsing. He was immediately rushed to the neighboring Mengo hospital. Unfortunately, shortly after his arrival to the Hospital, Joram died due to Meningitis and Aspiration Pneumonia. Joram's illness and death came very suddenly. Everyone in Sanyu was shocked and mourned for his passing. The staff, volunteers and a Priest attended a funeral for Joram. It was a very difficult day for everyone. At the same time, we found peace knowing he is with our loving Father. Joram will always remain a part of the Sanyu family. We thank God for his presence in Sanyu.

The Sanyu management gave her a decent send off with a farewell party here on our property. The party was filled with cake cutting, lots of drinks, singing and dancing; as well as crying as many of the children, staff and volunteers found it so hard to say good bye to her. She was presented with a gift and offered a retirement pension cheque to help her start her new life.

Scovia is

planning to begin her own retail store, selling textiles. We wish her well in her new business and we thank Scovia so much for her exemplary, selfless dedication and sacrifice to the service of Sanyu Babies' Home. You shall always be proudly remembered.



## Feature: The twins – Samuel and Silas



Samuel and Silas are some of the many children who come here when they are very small for their ages and could have easily passed away if not for the loving care and attention of the Sanyu staff. Born on 1<sup>st</sup> April, 2013 to 25 year old Alice, Samuel only weighed 1.7 kgs while Silas weighed 1.4 kgs on 6<sup>th</sup> April, 2013 when they arrived at Sanyu Babies' Home. Alice is Karamajong, a member of a tribe of people from the Northern area of Uganda. Many people from that area have come to Kampala as a result of the wars in that area, led by Joseph Kony of the Lord's Resistance Army. Alice is only one of the many Karamajongs who stay in the slums and on the streets of

Kampala looking for any type of work to make money. At only 6 days old, the twins were found placed on a dirty piece of cloth along Namirembe Road Street. They were completely naked, shivering and crying. Their mother had hired them out to a friend to use them to beg for money on the streets because she did not have anything to eat.

The twins have now been here for seven weeks and although they are small, there is hope. The main challenge is poor weight gain. They have to be fed very little amounts very often, which is hard for the mamas because they are on such a strict schedule with the 50 other children and hardly have the time. But with the help of the nurses and the volunteers, we hope that the twins will continue to grow. Please keep Samuel and Silas in your prayers.

In the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> Issue of our Newsletter, you met a very small and sick little baby girl named Rebecca with a heart condition that required surgery abroad. Donald and Irene Heare successfully gained Legal Guardianship over Rebecca and they managed to take her to America. She was immediately taken to a Children's Hospital where her medical needs are being taken care of. Since the last Newsletter came out, we did however get bad news about Rebecca's health. In addition to her heart condition, her doctors diagnosed her with Hypertension and a Kidney disorder. It was also found out that she has Sickle Cell Anemia.

Irene and Donald report that... "Rebecca is adapting and enjoying her new life with her forever family. She loves to go on walks in her stroller and for someone to read books to her. She also likes to listen to music. She is now up to 6kg. She will be seven months old on June 4th. She is sitting up with help and learning many new skills. She is laughing and loves to baby talk. She receives therapy at our house to help catch her up on developmental skills. She is a miracle and we are so blessed that God gave us this little treasure to take care of. We are asking prayers for Rebecca to gain physical strength and for God to continue to heal her little heart. We continue to pray for all the children and staff at Sanyu and are so thankful for the love and care that was provided to her."

## Staff Trainings

The past few months have been very busy for the staff at Sanyu Babies' Home. During the month of February and March, we were blessed to have Dr. Theresa Jones a Clinical Psychologist with us who carried out a couple of training sessions for the staff. The first session was about Attachment and the Importance of Early Relationships with Care givers. The second one was a discussion about the loss staff can feel when a child leaves and how they can be supported with this.

In the month of March still, we were blessed with a visit from Prof. Jill Vander Bent, Prof. Sarah Zuidema and Adey all from Bethany Christian Services in the United States who trained us on Exploring the Clinically Impacted Areas of Vulnerable Children. The training lasted for one week at Rweza Training and Conference Centre. This was a very unique training as it attracted the Sanyu Board members as well. Topics covered included Child/ Infant Development, Attachment, Grief and Loss, Trauma/Abuse and Neglect/Special Needs and Parenting Skills. The Social Workers had their special session where they were

trained on Conducting Investigations and Report making, Home Study Assessments, How to prepare children and Parents for Resettlement, Post Placement Reports, Fostering and Adoption and Post Adoption Assessments.

In May, the staff received another training from Liz Scott who is a retired Speech and Language Therapist from Scotland. Liz trained the staff on Early Language Development and how adults can encourage children's language skills.

The main goal of all the trainings was to learn skills and activities that the mamas, nurses and teachers can use with the kids to help them grow and flourish despite the institutionalized setting. The staff now feel better prepared to care for the children of Sanyu Babies' Home. Thanks to our dear trainers as well as Bethany Christian Services for having made this possible.

#### **Feature: Melissa Nakato and Gideon Waswa**



As students on internship at Sanyu Babies' Home we were lucky to be a part of the experience of re-uniting the twins Gideon and Melissa with their family. Gideon and Melissa were 10 months when they arrived to Sanyu Babies' Home on 21<sup>st</sup> September, 2011.

The children were taken to Mulago Hospital by their biological mother. While they were in the hospital, the mother developed mental problems and disappeared. The nurses continued to care for the children while they waited for their mother to return. When she did not return, they were referred to Sanyu Babies Home.

The main objective of Sanyu Babies Home is to reunite children with their biological family. If that is not possible, social workers attempt to place

children with a foster care family or finally begin to look for an adoptive family for a child. While Gideon and Melissa were at Sanyu, social workers made many attempts to locate their biological mother and other relatives. This required many trips to a village called Najja, in Mukono district, 1 and ½ hours from Sanyu. During their visits, they were able to locate someone who knew the twins mother and other members of her family. The twins' family held meetings to determine who would care for the children. After deciding that the twin's grandparents would care for Gideon and Melissa, they were invited to Sanyu

to begin bonding with the twins. They spent time over a month visiting with the children, until the 12<sup>th</sup> day of March 2013 when they were reunited with their family and brought home to Najja.

On the day that the twins were brought home, social workers from Sanyu accompanied them on the trip home. When everyone arrived at the village, the family welcomed us outside their house and was very happy to see Melissa and Gideon. We all sat together outside the house having some cold drinks and a talk. The family showed us the house and then they were given presents. With help from "Families for Children" Sanyu Babies' Home had brought things for the family such as a mattress, toys and books for the twins. "Families for Children" is an international organization that provides many programs, one of which is to provide items for children when they are reunited with their family. It was hard to leave the twins behind but we know that they are in good and loving hands for the rest of their lives.



## Students from Denmark



To all of you who didn't read the last newsletter, we are two Danish students having our internship at Sanyu Babies' home. We have been here since the 27<sup>th</sup> day of January, 2013 and we will leave at the end of June, 2013. We are specializing in the youngest children (0-1year). The focus that we have is to see every child as an individual human being. We are trying to see the world from the child's perspective and where the child is in its development. We look at the child's physical- and mental development also how the child's interaction is with the other children and adults.

We have made a program for five children all from 9-12 months. The program is to help the children individually with their development; physically and socially. We are together with the five children two times per week. We

play with them, give them massage, sing with them and help them with their psychically problems. During the week time we have been in baby class with teacher Moureen and teacher Allen. They have been helping us making the program work and they are giving us a lot of positive energy with their big hearts and nice sense of humor.

We are seeing that the program is working in a positive way for each of the five children and together with the physiotherapist Julie, we are making notes on each child and its development.

It is almost the end of our stay and we have been grateful to be here. We will miss the children, the home and Kampala.

## Volunteer Report: A life time memory at SBH

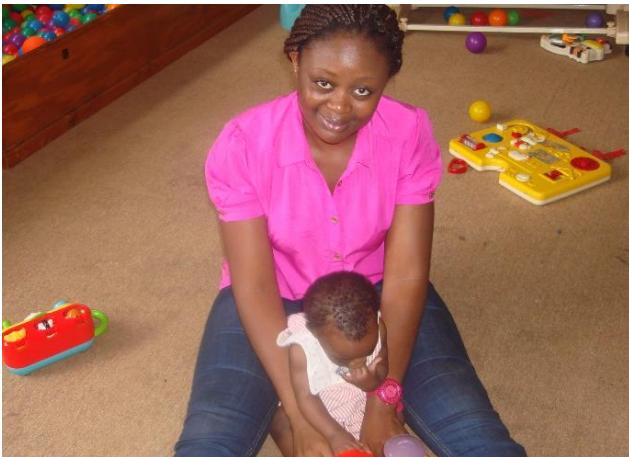
